

A warm welcome to De Montfort University's annual week of cultural events, cultural eXchanges. The programme includes lectures, performances, debates, presentations and readings from a diverse body of artists, academics, practitioners and those working in the cultural industries. It offers the opportunity for the Faculty of Humanities at DMU to demonstrate the nature of its interests in contemporary culture, and to open its doors to everyone in the city and the region. As you will see from the programme, cultural eXchanges continues to live up to its name: this year we will be featuring exchanges between cultures ranging from politics through to drama and music to food; exchanges between past literatures and contemporary society; the exchange of discussion and debate; and the exchanges between creativity and its audiences in sessions wherein artists explain or read from their work. BRITISH SHAKESPEARE ASSOCIATION LECTURE

Professor Julia Briggs

The recently-founded British Shakespeare Association is designed to bring together devotees from all walks of life to explore and enjoy Shakespeare's work. Dame Judi Dench is its President, and an inaugural conference was held at De Montfort University in August 2003.

Professor Julia Briggs will explore a significant dimension of Shakespeare's work in this lecture aimed at academics and enthusiasts alike. A Professor of English Literature at De Montfort University and an Emeritus Fellow of Hertford College, Oxford, Professor Briggs has recently completed a study of Virginia Woolf as Writer (Penguin, 2005), and is embarking on an account of 'Shakespeare in Context' (for OUP).


THE SMALL PRESS: PUBLISHING ON A SHOESTRING?




