Masters Level Learning

Three students commenced the dissertation year of their Masters programme in palliative care. Their research is looking at the following:

- The role of senior hospice nurses in the discussion of DNAR orders with patients and families
- The bereavement needs of family carers of mesothelioma decedents
- The perception of nurses of the role of the Chaplain in secondary palliative care

These are the first students ever in this programme and it feels an exciting achievement for the Masters team.

Kate McClelland, Head of Spiritual & Pastoral Care at Braunstone Health & Social Centre, shares her experience....



My name is Kate McClelland. I am currently working as a Head of Spiritual and Pastoral Care at Braunstone Health and Social Centre. For my dissertation module of the Masters in Palliative care I am undertaking a research project entitled; Spiritual Care at end of life: A nurse's perspective. The conception for the research followed an in depth internal project which focused on spiritual assessments on patients placed on the LCP. I am taking a grounded theory constructivist approach to my research which is in the form of semistructured interviews. I intend to interview approximately ten nurses who have a special interest in palliative care.

The purpose of the research is to gather information initially in three identifiable areas. Firstly; spirituality, an understanding of what it means in a clinical environment. Secondly; nurses perceptions of chaplaincy provision at end of life. Thirdly; media influences on those perceptions and the impact it may have on service provision. This research has been identified as service evaluation. It is anticipated that the results of the findings will go to improve chaplaincy provision within the Trust and ultimately impact on providing better patient care.

Local GP Mentoring Through CPEP

Hi...I'm a GP at Willbrook Medical Centre, Thurmaston, and also the clinical lead for end of life services for the City of Leicester CCG (Clinical Commissioning Group).

I've been involved with LOROS long before I became a doctor – I was a volunteer, and I have fond memories of summer fetes. After medical school, I was lucky enough to land a training job at the hospice - the 6 month post taught me a tremendous amount. Given the constraints of GP training not all of us get the chance to work in palliative care and sharing that excellent experience which has driven my current role. All GP's want to do the best they can for their patients, but sometimes we don't have all the training or information we need.

To meet this gap, I've been working with CPEP, Macmillan, LOROS and the local CCG. Four excellent local GP's are being trained at CPEP, and will use their expertise to improve End of Life Care through the CCG. Additionally, all City GP's have had the opportunity of some great training with LOROS.

Over the next year or so we hope the training and expertise from CPEP will be translated into better care for patients.

Education Team Celebrate Award Winning Book

Dr Christina Faull, Consultant in Palliative Medicine and Medical Lead for Education and Research and Sharon de Caestecker, former Director of Education and Training, are celebrating the third edition of the *Handbook of Palliative Care* which was published in December by Wiley-Blackwell. The first edition won the prestigious

British Medical Association medical book of the year award in 1999.

Dr Faull said, "I hope that the book is easy to read and helps doctors, nurses and even families and patients to be more confident about making life as good as possible in advanced illness."

Sharon de Caestecker said, "Putting into writing our classroom based teaching, about how patients and families want us to communicate with them, was challenging; but I hope that we've produced a book that will support healthcare professionals in providing quality care."

ENTER Project

Enabling Nurses to Engage in Research

Identifying the importance of research in end of life care and fostering a research culture is a key step for healthcare providers if they are to move forward in addressing some of the challenges highlighted by the End of Life Care Strategy (DH, 2008).

The ENTER project has been established in recognition of this need and aims to enhance the ability and confidence of nurses to engage in research activity, breaking down the fears associated with the research process, addressing myths that currently exist and re-establishing research as an important ingredient in ensuring high quality, evidence-based end-of-life care.

Seven senior nurses (band 6 and above) attended a three day workshop which comprised of a mixture of taught sessions on the research process, sharing examples of research practices, introducing the 'human face' of teams such as Research and Development and Ethics

Committees and reviewing currently available resources.

The group of nurses quickly established themselves as a support network for each other and although the project was originally time limited, a Community of Practice is now being explored with support from Macmillan. In addition, a web based resource is being developed that will support nurses to foster a culture of enquiry, develop their own research practices and enable others to engage in research activity.
