3. Course Description

Characteristics and Aims

The aim of this programme is to provide UK and International nurses that have already undertaken their nurse education in their country of origin, an opportunity to enhance and develop their knowledge and skills in research, leadership, education and practice in order to influence nursing within a global arena as a top-up programme to graduate level.

They will explore and debate the global health challenges faced in nursing across the globe. It will encourage nurses to build upon their existing knowledge and experience, and will allow them to focus on health areas that are pertinent to their own healthcare settings. The diverse range of skills the learners will bring to this programme will provide a rich learning environment for reflection and debate around international healthcare systems. Learners will have the opportunity to learn both within the School of Nursing and Midwifery and the Faculty of Health and Life Sciences.

Teaching, Learning and Assessment Strategies

The learning, teaching and assessment strategies within this curriculum adhere to the DMU assessment policy and are underpinned by the University's Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy (ULTAS 2012 - 2015) and Faculty Teaching, Learning and Assessment Strategy (FLTAS 2012 - 2013) which aim to support students in transition into undergraduate education.

The Guiding Principles of this are:

- Supporting students through HE
- · Maintaining the currency of the curriculum
- Communicating with students
- Assessment of students.

The Faculty (of Health and Life Sciences) Learning Teaching and Assessing Strategy (FLTAS) for Implementation, reflects the University Strategy and has been utilised to inform the development of the programme philosophy and programme learning, teaching and assessment strategy. The approaches are designed to draw on the students' current experiences and encourage the application of newly acquired knowledge to practice through shared learning. All undergraduate students are entitled to 2 hours of English Language Support classes per week during term time. These are organised by the Centre for English Language Learning and the highly-qualified staff have a wide knowledge of DMU programmes and systems. The classes are timetabled at various times of the day and in the early evening to allow students to attend when they are free and students can choose a time which suits them. The syllabus for this course includes academic writing e.g. how to write essays and reports, academic reading, citation and referencing, speaking in seminars and lectures as well as advanced grammar and some social English. Staff will consult with students at the beginning of term and work out a syllabus for their needs.

The focus of the programme is student-centred learning and includes a wide variety of learning and teaching strategies. There is an enquiry-based focus to the curriculum, but other student-centred activities include case studies, scenarios, small group work, action learning sets, workshops, reflection and student presentations. This aims to facilitate the students' ability to integrate theory with international nursing practice and meet the increasingly diverse needs of our student groups.

It is through the variety of student-centred activities that all students will develop the skills to critique and synthesise ideas, evaluate and reframe arguments and apply the knowledge to international nursing practice. The ability of the student to be able to evaluate the evidence

base is a core theme that runs across the programme.

The use of Technology Enhanced Learning and information technology skills will be taught and developed throughout the programme to enable students' to access information to maximise their learning and enable them to succeed within the modern workplace. This will include making maximum use of the Virtual Learning Environment. The DMU 'Draft threshold for the use of technologies document' have been utilised to guide the design and development of the Blackboard learning materials and will be used for each module.
