Postponing Childbirth, Extending Fertility? Biotechnologies and Transformations of Reproductive Life

On Thursday 12th and Friday 13th May, 2016, [Dr Nicky Hudson](#), [Professor Lorraine Culley](#), [Dr Nolwenn Buhler](#), [Kylie Baldwin](#), [Dr Irene Daly](#), [Dr Cathy Herbrand](#) and [Caroline Law](#) from [De Montfort University](#), convened an international, multi – disciplinary symposium on postponing childbirth exploring age, time, gender, reproduction and technology. This event was funded via the Wellcome Trust and the School of Applied Social Science at De Montfort University.

The event brought together a number of stakeholders including academics, clinical practitioners, charity and advocacy group representatives, independent researchers and PHD students in order to discuss the current state of knowledge on biotechnologies and their effect on anticipating, screening, preserving, or extending fertility.
