#### Human Reproduction Study Group Annual Conference

On Tuesday 23rd May 2017, <u>Kylie Baldwin</u> and <u>Dr Cathy Herbrand</u> of DMU's Centre for Reproduction Research hosted the Annual Conference of the British Sociological Association's Human Reproduction Study Group.

The plenary address was given by <u>Jacqui Gabb</u>, Professor at the <u>Faculty of Arts and Social</u> <u>Science</u> at <u>The Open University</u>. Delegates came from the UK but also overseas to present on topics including complex reproduction decision – making, shared parenting, imaginaries of the foetus, reproductive autonomy in controversial context, the ambivalences of medical professionals and practices in donation.
